## Thank You!

A big thank you to all who participated in the January 27 Electronic Collection Event held at the Birmingham Zoo. In spite of the rain, we had a great turnout. 537 vehicles representing 606 households from 31 local jurisdictions within 51 unique zip codes were served. 12.92 tons of electronics were collected and 6.05 tons of paper were shredded during the event. Your efforts have kept these electronics out of the landfill and potentially reduced illegal dumping sites. The electronics collected by the vendor were 100% recycled or reused. Extracting the various components of electronics such as copper, silver, gold, and palladium allows these precious metals to be reused rather than being discarded and reduces the need for new mining activities. Less mining protects the habitats of many animals such as gorillas, chimpanzees, and elephants.
